DNR sought tribe's OK in reporting spearing incident

Folks, in my estimation the proper way to start this newsletter is with an article some of you members in the Lakeland area may have read in The Lakeland Times newspaper. However, I think it's so important for all the members to be informed so I am running this article by Patti Wenzel that appeared in The Lakeland Times. Our thanks to The Lakeland Times and Patti Wenzel.

Are certain officials with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) more interested in protecting the image of the Lac du Flambeau (LdF) tribe than publicizing the apprehension of three tribal members who allegedly speared an illegal number of walleyes?

DNR emails obtained this week by The Lakeland Times suggest that is exactly what is happening, with the agency's chief law enforcement officer urging the DNR to coordinate with the tribe a public relations response to the incident

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Even though tribal officials themselves told the DNR they were upset over the spearing issue.

Taken from DNR emails

The information about the incident, which occurred April 20 at Big Carr Lake in Lake Tomahawk, was taken from interoffice DNR emails, which show a concerted effort to defer to the tribe, while developing the best story for a bad situation.

According to an email dated April 21, from DNR Warden Tom Kroeplin to Woodruff Warden Supervisor Tom Wrasse and Northern Region Enforcement Leader Mike Bartz, GLIFWC wardens discovered three tribal spearers violating walleye limits on Big Carr Lake. At some point that evening, GLIFWC wardens Jonas Moermond and Roger McGeshick observed a spearing boat near the shore with its lights off for an extended period of time.

When the wardens approached the area where the boat had been docked, they were joined by Kroeplin. The trio discovered approximately 20 large walleyes on the shore. At that time, they devised a plan to apprehend the spearers when they came back to the shore.

After several hours, the spearers returned and dumped more fish on the shore, at which time they were taken into custody by the officers.

A total of 45 walleyes

According to Kroeplin's account, the spearers had a total of 45 walleyes, which was nine fish over their combined limit. Kroeplin adds in the email that 33 of the fish were too big, some more than 29 inches in length, with others ranging from 12-14 pounds.

Big Carr Lake was declared to have a total tribal harvest this season of 48 fish. Tribal members are allowed to spear two big

fish (one 20-24 inches, and one of any size over 20 inches) per permit.

A three-walleye bag limit was planned for Big Carr Lake for the upcoming season. DNR officials said the April 20 incident will not change that bag limit for hook-and-line anglers.

Kroeplin finished his email by recommending that Moermond and McGeshick receive a "pat on the back" for their efforts.

Need to get ahead of this

On April 22, Wrasse weighed in with an email of his own to Bartz, Northern Region Director John Gozdziwski and DNR Law Enforcement Bureau Director Randall Stark.

He said his email was meant to urge an announcement of the incident sooner rather than later, to highlight the good work DNR and GLIFWC wardens were doing.

"For as often as we make an effort to highlight good cases around the state in a step toward bullet-proofing our constituents, I feel as if we should do the same with what happened the other night during spear fishing," Wrasse wrote.

"I know history shows those types of issues are kept behind closed doors for the most part. But this is one of the grossest fishing violations I have ever seen," he added.

Wrasse continued in the e-mail to explain that discussion of the incident had been getting around the boat landings and the spearers were not being supported in their actions.

"In fact the tribal chair (LdF President Vicki Doud) called them in and her comment was 'those guys have no remorse whatsoever for what they did,'" Wrasse wrote.

"One of the spearers was heard to be saying, **'I'm Indian, those are my fish anyway.'**"

Wrasse added that, according to DNR biologists, the spearers' actions decimated the top end of the fishery at Big Carr Lake. The lake is stocked and has no reproduction capabilities.

"It literally took years and years to produce those fish and they are gone within a couple hours' worth of thrill killing," Wrasse concluded.

Wrasse acknowledged the emails when contacted by The Lakeland Times on Tuesday. He said he wanted the DNR to use the incident as an educational opportunity, to show the public the good the DNR and GLIFWC wardens are doing.

"I wanted to get ahead of this and I wanted everybody on board," Wrasse said Tuesday. "That's why I contacted my superiors."

Negative spin

On April 23, Stark weighed in with his own email, saying a press release should be issued to avoid the "incident being spun against the Native American community."

"This could result in negative spin on spearfishing," Stark wrote. "But, bottom line, it happened and fortunately the people were caught and stopped because of the state/GLIFWC cooperation."

Stark suggested talking points and quotes to be used in any release issued by the DNR, including quotes that could be attributed to himself, Wrasse or Bartz.

He also added a quote that he said GLIFWC Chief Warden Fred Maulson "was OK with."

"This is a serious assault on everyone's resource," Maulson is quoted as saying. "We're going to prosecute these individuals vigorously. Actions like this undermine conservation efforts, our local economy and everyone's ability to legally harvest trophy fish like this."

Stark asked for quotes from Kroepelin and the GLIFWC wardens involved, highlighting the teamwork necessary between the two agencies to apprehend these types of suspects.

Wrasse responded, saying any release should have a comment from the tribe showing it to be on board with the direction the case was going.

Stark concurred that the tribe needed to be included.

"It's critical the tribe get quoted in this article," he wrote. "Otherwise we should not do it."

Attempts to obtain a comment from Stark concerning his emails were unsuccessful as of press time.

Wrasse responded on April 24 that Carl Edwards, a member of the LdF tribal council, was apprehensive about providing a press release about the incident.

After a discussion between Maulson and his father, Tom Maulson, a tribal council member and one of the leaders in the 1980s to restore tribal fishing rights, it was concluded that this was a GLIFWC case and that it shouldn't issue any release, with or without tribal support.

GLIFWC actions

As of Tuesday, GLIFWC wardens are investigating the Big Carr incident, according to GLIFWC public information director Sue Erickson.

The agency is not releasing any details of the investigation.

"There was an incident related to spearing that occurred on Big Carr Lake in Oneida County on April 20," Erickson said. "All violations will be cited into tribal court, once the investigation is completed."

Erickson said her agency hadn't planned on issuing a press release concerning the incident, but added that the tribe has been involved in the investigation.

Dear Mr. Graunke:

Thank you for your letter of inquiry dated May 7, 2006. It is the policy of the Great Lakes Indian Fish and Wildlife Commission not to disclose the details or records of an investigation of possible violations of any law (tribal or otherwise) that our officers are authorized to enforce. We wish neither to compromise or jeopardize the outcome of any such investigation nor to prejudice the eventual prosecution of any alleged violations in the court of proper jurisdiction. Simply put, our policy is to perform our law enforcement duties faithfully and thoroughly, to refer alleged violations to the proper prosecuting authority and to allow the process for administering justice to take place in the court of competent jurisdiction.

Two-thirds of California voters oppose growing efforts by some Indian tribes to build casinos in urban centers of the state, according to the results of a new statewide survey released today by the East Bay Coalition against Urban Casinos.

The survey of 800 voters also shows that more than 70 percent of respondents want the Federal and state government to take action to close exemptions and loopholes in current laws that allow tribes to build casinos wherever they want, even if local communities don't want them. A number of bills presently moving through the process in Washington, D.C and Sacramento would address holes in gaming laws that make it possible for tribes to actively propose and plan for multiple casinos in heavily urbanized parts of the state -- like the East San Francisco Bay Area and Orange County

"This poll clearly demonstrates that the public does not buy into the outrageous claims made by proponents of urbanized gaming," said Professor William Thompson, Ph.D., University of Nevada, Las Vegas and author of a recently published economic analysis of the Casino San Pablo. "Local casinos will only bring more economic harm than benefit, along with

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the numerous social ills resulting in increased crime, traffic, and domestic abuse."

The survey also showed that nearly 70 percent opposed the practice of "reservation shopping," where tribes from distant rural areas try to buy land in urban areas -- usually with funding from non-Indian investors -- and have the government take the land in trust for them so they can build casinos.

"In the case of three proposed Indian casinos within the Richmond-San Pablo area, including the Scotts Valley Band of Pomo Indians' \$200 million casino targeted right in our backyard of North Richmond, the actual lands of the Indian groups are 100 or more miles away," said Andres Soto, coalition co-chair of Communities United to Stop Urban Casinos, a group of Bay Area residents concerned about the expansion of urban casinos in their local communities. "These results show that if people were given a legitimate chance to determine the future of their local communities by voting on whether or not casinos could be built, that the vast majority of Californians would soundly reject it."

Almost 70 percent of those surveyed agreed that California cities are not designed to handle the impacts of major problems caused by the huge Las Vegas-style casinos proposed by tribes -- like traffic gridlock, increased crime, environmental problems and social problems caused by compulsive gambling. The survey of 800 California voters by the Washington, D.C. firm Voter/Consumer Research had margin or error of plus or minus 3.5 percent.

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Follow the Money.

May 26, 2006--Gov. Jim Doyle issued a series of vetoes late Friday, including ones on bills regulating piers, giving lawmakers a say in approving new off-reservation casinos and barring illegal immigrants from enrolling in state public assistance programs.

"Jim Doyle waited until most voters were leaving for vacation and then tried to sneak the vetoes by," Senate Majority Leader Dale Schultz (R-Richland Center) said in a statement.

Piers: Doyle said he vetoed the bill on piers because lawmakers did not stick by a compromise that had been struck. He recently issued an executive order that he said would stick by that deal.

"We're not going after anyone's piers. My executive order is consistent with the compromise we worked out," Doyle said.

Doyle's order states that piers wider than 8 feet or that have loading platforms at the end of docks that exceed 300 square feet might require limitations. But Republicans said the veto was another case of overregulation by Doyle. "It's very silly," said Rep. Scott Gunderson (R-Waterford), chairman of the Assembly Natural Resources Committee.

He noted that a recent Legislative Council legal opinion shows Doyle's powers are limited. The opinion also emphasized that it is difficult to say whether Doyle is exceeding his authority.

The Department of Natural Resources says that 99% of the docks installed on lakes meet state standards.

Casinos: One of the vetoed bills would have required the

Legislature, in addition to the governor, to sign off on any new off-reservation casinos. Now, the governor alone approves proposals for new casinos once they clear the federal Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Doyle said the bill ran counter to federal law, even though some states give their legislatures a voice in approving casinos.

When Doyle was attorney general, he supported legislative oversight of casinos.

Gard said current law puts too much power in the governor's hands, and the state would get more money from tribes for their casinos if the Legislature played a role.

"Taxpayers would get a lot better deal if there were more checks and balances," he said. The veto comes as tribes pursue new casinos in Kenosha, Beloit and Shullsburg.

U.S. Rep. Mark Green of Green Bay, a Republican challenging Doyle in this fall's election, said Doyle's veto of the gaming oversight bill had more to do with campaign contributions than a policy decision.

"I don't know how anyone concludes this veto was based on anything but tribal gaming campaign contributions," he said in a statement.

Kenosha casino developer Dennis Troha and his associates have spent \$300,000 to help Doyle since 2002. That same year, tribes spent nearly \$1 million to boost the campaigns of Doyle and other Democrats.

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Where's Your Acre?

School is out. The weather is warm. Summer is finally here and that means its time for many families to pull out the tent,

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find the cooler, grab the bug spray, pack the bags, and hit the road for the annual vacation.

We are lucky. We don't have to travel far from our homes to find an abundance of outdoor activities to enjoy. With nearly a hundred state parks, forests, recreation areas, and trails, Wisconsin is the perfect summer vacation destination. Of course, these opportunities don't come cheap. Taxpayer dollars are spent on improving, maintaining, and expanding our public lands.

The Stewardship fund, the state's land purchasing program, spends \$60 million in borrowed money on land acquisition every year. That's over \$800 million in land purchases for the 20 year program. More than 225,000 acres have been purchased already. That's a lot of land and a whole lot of debt.

The federal government owns nearly 2 million acres in Wisconsin, for national parks, forests, and trust lands. The DNR owns more than a million acres (that they know of), and the state's 72 counties own nearly 2.4 million acres for the same purposes.

In the 18 counties which make up the northern part of the state one acre out of every three is government owned. In fact, publicly owned forests, parks, trust lands, fisheries, recreational areas, and preserves add up to nearly 6 million acres - 16% of the state's total acreage.

Add in the land under public buildings, schools, court houses, universities, etc (but not underneath roads), and the figure jumps to 22%. So more than one out of every five acres is government owned in Wisconsin. That's more than one acre for every man, woman, and child.

Wouldn't you like to be able to pick your acre? Think what a prime piece of lake front state forest land in Minocqua would be worth.

I'm not saying we should sell off our public lands. I use our public parks system and the trails frequently. They are a valuable resource that makes our state unique.

The question is how much is enough? How much land should the governments in Wisconsin own? Thirty percent, fifty percent, eighty percent, one hundred percent? Where do we draw the line? I think we should draw a line, instead of the current policy of more and more and more.

Remember as the government buys more land, there is less private land on the tax rolls. Meaning we pay more in our property taxes to make up the difference.

Instead of buying more and more land, we should decide how much is enough and then go about upgrading the land we own. Sell that which has less public value and replace it with land that has higher public value. In Wisconsin we must change the way we view our government. It cannot just be more and more, which is the current way that it is.

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Another View Of "Sovereignty"

Most, if not all, of the Indian tribes in our country claim to possess sovereignty as a tribe. This is both untrue and not possible under our U.S. Constitution and the Constitutions of the several States.

Today, and indeed since the Indian Citizenship Act of June 2, 1924, which gave the then non-citizen Indians (mostly tribal members) citizenship by birth, Page 6

all American Indians are citizens of the United States of America and of the state that they individually live in.

They each, as well as all other citizens of the United States, possess the attribute of sovereignty that is given to each citizen of our country by the Constitution of the United States.

Sovereignty in our nation belongs to the citizens. It does not rest in the state capitals, nor in the federal government at our national capital, Washington D.C. Our sovereignty is not vested in a king, a dictator, a president, nor in elected position of the various states or federal government, and indeed---not in tribes.

In short, when our thirteen colonies/states came together and decided to unite, they declared and established a number of principles and rules to include the following: Majority Rules; then, Sovereignty would rest with the citizens; Through the Articles of Confederation and then the Constitution, they needed and established a national government to do limited national activities with enumerated powers only; Through these Articles and then the Constitution, they assured the rights of the sovereign and several independent states, the freedom, liberty and certain other individual citizens' rights, and placed fixed limitations upon the federal government; They established a method to change the Constitution.

Indians and their tribes were not only considered but they were mentioned in the primary documents that established our nation. The tribes were not given a place in our federal system of government. The Tenth Amendment of our Constitution specifically provides guidance on this matter and tribes are not included in the distribution of power (to govern). It is well worth

reading in order to reacquaint ourselves with these documents.

The Declaration of Independence gives a good idea of how our forefathers thought of the Indians at that time in our history.

Treaty after treaty stipulated that the tribes were to obey the Constitution and the acts of Congress.

Supreme Court cases abound with the clear facts that the tribes were no longer sovereign but bound to the Constitutional requirements and the will of Congress.

Battle after battle defeated the Indian tribes resulting in the tribes being conquered, subjugated and actually subordinated to the will of this nation.

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"When in the Course of Human events It Becomes Necessary..."

It is a phone call from some stranger in Lima, Ohio or Lynden, Washington, frantic about a monstrous tax-free tribal casino plunging into their quiet community, uninvited and unwelcome. It is a call from a young mother whose beautiful 2-year old child has been abducted by a kangaroo tribal court and missing to her for over 115 days. It is Nebraska neighbors anguishing over the brutal beating of a fellow farmer on his own land - beaten by tribal police. It is the faces of U.S. citizens in Salamanca, New York, in the 1990's, forced to stand in

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long lines to sign "Surrenders" to the Seneca Nation of Indians, turning over to a tribal government, the deeds to their homes, with no compensation.

Long before a few colonists could imagine freedom, the yearning for it proved intolerable. Securing freedom became necessary in the 1700's. Daily engaging in the pursuit of freedom was a priority for which men and women risked their lives.

In this 21st century, we are in another necessary time for this country. Only it is not the British that are coming. It is tribalism, collectivism-federal Indian policy and extreme multiculturalism that have relegated U.S. taxpayers as muzzled, indentured servants who must remain politically correct and suffer escalating costs of political and financial support for ethnic systems taking this country apart.

Freedom and equality are losing the battle to a keenly orchestrated global Indigenous Movement spreading like a cancer through the United States. Like diabetes, the onset eludes us until the system has fallen.

Around this time of year, I tend to review beloved old documents like our Declaration of Independence. My life path has forced me through a complex internal debate. Descending from Cherokee ancestry, I grew up in Spokane, Washington, learned to sled on Manito Hill, and was a schoolgirl ardent admirer of Chief Joseph and Sacajawea. I equally cherished Daniel Boone, Davy Crockett and Lewis and Clark. We can barely speak of these men in this new millennium.

Now in my early '60s, living within the exterior boundaries of a large Indian reservation has caused me serious discovery and reflection. I made a deeply personal decision to continue honoring my ancestry with reverence
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for Native American culture, while refuting every effort of a tribal government to govern, tax or regulate me or other U.S. citizens. I pledge allegiance only to the government that I elect and in which I may participate.

Our founders for whom it became necessary never dreamed that in a new and free United States, our own elected officials would delegate powers to sub-governments that remove Constitutional and civil rights of any citizen, much less Native Americans. **Or mine.**

So words in the beloved Declaration ring fearfully true these days, with simple substitutions: *"...That to secure these (certain unalienable) Rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just Powers from the Consent of the Governed, that whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these Ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its Foundation on such Principles, and organizing its Powers in such Form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness.*

Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient Causes; and accordingly all Experience hath shown, that Mankind are more disposed to suffer, while Evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the Forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long Train of Abuses and Usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object, evinces a Design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their Right, it is their Duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future Security. Such has been the patient Sufferance of these American Indians and citizens; and such is now the Necessity which constrains them

to alter federal Indian policy. The History of the present Congress is a History of repeated Injuries and Usurpations, all having in direct Object the Establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these American Indians and other citizens.

Congress has combined with others to subject us to a Jurisdiction foreign to our Constitution, and unacknowledged by our Laws; giving Congressional Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation;"

A mere 50 States hosts 562 tribal governments, with 274 more "tribes" in line for federal recognition and their casinos. These tax-exempt governments that refute the U.S. Constitution, can ignore state and local laws, and are using millions of slot machines to initialize additional land and tax grabs, pushing far off reservations to the direct harm of one community after another. An annual 25 billion dollar gambling monopoly has not reduced federal funds paid by taxpayers to tribal governments. When Penny Funk completed a state application to hold a "Ducky Derby" fund-raiser in Owen last summer, she wanted to make sure her ducks were all in a row.

The event was the primary fund-raiser for House of Friends, an after-school program for underprivileged kids in Clark County. In previous years, the event collected \$1,500 - a modest amount that helped the small organization stay afloat. After working with other groups to put on the event, House of Friends felt ready to fly solo with the duck derby.

But the state Office of Charitable Gaming denied the group's Ducky Derby application - it's an illegal lottery, they said. Funk cried foul.

"This is ridiculous," she said. "You never would think (of) something as harmless as a rubber ducky race being illegal."

State laws on gambling outlaw the rubber duck races, although they are held frequently across the state. Funk said she is now fishing for support to reverse the law.

"It's harmless fun. It's something a family can do," she said. "I can't see why it has to be so difficult to hold an event like that."

In a duck derby fund-raiser, people buy rubber ducks, each with a different number. The ducks are placed in a pond or river for a race to a finish line. The person who has the winning duck gets a cash prize.
